9.50 am	<p>Assessing the Impact of Academic Research Support Services/ Sue Henczel, Infase Solutions (Australia)</p> <p>This presentation will explore the application of the ISO 16439:2014 framework to academic research support services through the determination of impact areas, the development of impact statements, objectives and indicators. It will discuss the various elements of inferred (statistics and performance measures) and solicited (surveys, interviews, anecdotal evidence and feedback) evidence required to support an impact assessment. Through this exploration it is possible to describe, evaluate and assess the difference that academic research support services makes to the academic environment in which it operates.</p>

This is to ensure the funding body secures a high return on their investment. As universities rely on external funding to conduct research, libraries have responded by developing or enhancing services to collect and collate metrics to measure research impact. In this panel session three Australian library services will be presented, followed by discussion from the floor, including the opportunity to briefly outline impact services at your library.</p>
